

Jörg Genslein



Jörg Genslein is a singer and a musical director. He was born in 1978 in Bamberg and received his first musical education as member of the Regensburger Domspatzen boy's choir. After finishing high-school, he first studied classical voice and in October 2002, he came to Dresden to study choral conducting with Hans-Christoph

Rademann. Since his degree in 2007, he was appointed as assistant director to Hans-Christoph Rademann and as lecturer at the Carl Maria von Weber College of Music in Dresden.

Succeeding Prof. Dr. Bernd Englbrecht, Jörg Genslein directed the Renner Ensemble Regensburg from 2003 to 2010. Under his direction, the ensemble was awarded several first prizes at international choir competitions. Concert tours took them to France, England, Switzerland and South East Asia. Other highlights of this co-operation have been the CD production "...wallen Engel durch das Korn..." with works of Max Reger and Hugo Wolf which have received laudatory attention by the specialised press and on the radio.

As tenor Jörg Genslein joins renowned vocal ensembles like Kammerchor Stuttgart or RIAS Kammerchor. As a soloist he dedicates himself more and more to classical song and oratorios.

Jörg Genslein is often invited to co-operate with directors like Riccardo Chailly, Adam Fischer, Sir Roger Norrington or Herbert Blomstedt and important ensembles like RIAS Kammerchor and first of all the Dresdner Kammerchor, which he directs regularly.

Furthermore, the passionate fan of 1. FC Nürnberg is teaching several choir workshops. He was awarded the 2007 Carl Maria von Weber sponsorship of the College of Music Dresden and he received a scholarship from the Richard Wagner Association.

In May 2008, Jörg Genslein was selected from a variety of candidates to be the new musical director of the supra-regional chamber choir "Thüringischer Akademischer Singkreis" (TASK). During its summer tour 2011 the TASK produced the first recording under his direction with works by Engelbrecht and Brahms. It will be released this winter.
